


Sidney Script Dariations

The script marking on Sidney Cookware pieces is very attractive and interesting. Dan Griggs of Wallsville, Texas has collected and identified five variations of the script marking.


1) Sidney (only) found on Numbers 8, 9, 11, 12 Skillets and a No. 9

From The Editor

In the past, I have given information regarding cleaning aluminum in a self-cleaning oven. It works great, However, take notice - I recently cleaned a number five aluminum Oval Roaster in our self-cleaning oven. The cover warped from end to end!! The warp was slight but now the cover doesn't fit.

I also have to get this off my chest: I recently purchased a No. 8 Chick Fryer which had obviously been cleaned by burning it in a fire. You know, the red cast and flat, dull appearance. When I got it home, I placed a cover on the skillet. It didn't fit! Why? The skillet had warped slightly from the handle to the front. I also have a No. 9 skillet which is warped severely from someone cleaning it by putting it in a fire. Don't do it!! It is the poorest and laziest way of cleaning. About a year ago, I talked with a collector who told me he has a No. 14 skillet hanging on his wall just to remind him not to try cleaning a piece in the fire. The fourteen is severely warped.

On another note - I have been try to get KnC on an earlier schedule but I guess it's not going to happen for a couple of issues. The summer is very busy for us with doing shows (back to back), moving lawn, refinishing, etc. Also, we will be traveling during the month of September, taking a trip across the country. I am hoping to research a couple of foundries along the way and am planning to photograph a couple of large collections for the next book. The Sept/Oct issue of KnC will be out in mid-October. 



JS: Apparently the Chicago Foundry Co. bought the rights to Favorite when the Favorite Stove Co. dissolved in the mid 1930s, -ed.



The pestle is marked "2&3"-no marks are on the ball, but it fits in the mortar with clearance for the pestle. In appearance it is identical to the illustration on Pg. 93 of Griswold Cast Iron, 1996 Prices-A Price Guide: L-W Book Sales. Could you please offer any assistance. -J&MK

J&MK: L-W Book Sales? Yuk. The pestle is the correct one for your mortar. Let me refer you to page 188 of The Book of Griswold & Wagner. Notice the shape of the correct pestle. As for the ball, I have no idea. I doubt it has anything to do with this piece. -ed.





Dave: I received the new Muffin Pan Book written by Jon Haussler. I do have to say the pictures and drawings are very nice. I feel some of the prices are a little overpriced. I'm a little concerned about the section on pattern numbers. Mr. Haussler refers to pattern numbers being for internal use at Griswold and were never published in sales catalogs. But then in the bibliography, Mr. Haussler refers to Catalog #45 and the Griswold Mfg Co. Extra Finish Cast Iron Cooking Utensils catalog; apparently he has never read them because in both catalogs they have pattern numbers, not only on muffin pans but on several other pieces of Griswold.


Mr. Haussler also made the statement, "Word of mouth has always been the best form of advertising. Successful cooks using Griswold pans that were marked Griswold proved to be a very effective sales force." Does Mr. Haussler realize when Griswold started, most of the west wasn't even developed yet. Did one wagon train tell another to use Griswold? In the early 1900's, Griswold hired salesmen; they were given territories and worked these areas for three months at a time, before returning back to Erie. Then if that item they were trying to sell didn't do well, they moved it to a different area. Also, in the early 1900's Griswold advertised heavily. They had an art department along with an advertising department. I guess I feel when a book is written, and statements like the two I have pointed out are made, the author should have done his research. -JVB

Dave: I recently purchased a #5 chrome skillet in our local antique mall. I have not yet cleaned it so was unable to get a clear picture. I am enclosing a drawing of the marking on the back. I am interested in any background history on this piece and the value of it. Could this be railroad piece? Thanks for the good work on your publications of Kettles 'n Cookware. -DE




DE: I have no knowledge about this piece. Perhaps one of our Canadian subscribers can help. I doubt it is a railroad piece. -ed.

This Omelette Pan is not listed in your book. It is slightly smaller than the A54 Omelette pan that you have listed. I saw it was in the 1985 Harned's Griswold Book. Could you give me an idea of its value?

Thanks for calling my attention to this piece. The pattern number will be added to the p/n list. I would value it at about the same as the A54 pan.

Your book lists Erie griddles up to No. 9. I found this No. 10 with the number under the handle. Could you give me an idea of its value.




Again, thanks for calling my attention to this piece. I guess we will have to amend The Book when it is reprinted. Value \$45. -ed.

This one has me puzzled, it has a great, smooth casing so I don't think it 's a repro. It is missing the "866" on the front piece but the 921 and 922 are on the handles. The front half fits over the back and the two pieces that protrude forward by the base are higher up and not level with the base as in the "866" piece. I'd be interested in anything you know about it and what value you think it might have. -LG

BOOK REVIEW: Griswold Muffin Pans by Jon Haussler

The newest book on Griswold is finally on the market. The book, Griswold Muffin Pans by Jon Haussler, is specifically about muffin pans and their variations. In recent years, some collectors have identified slight differences in Griswold Muffin Pans, calling them variations. This book details these variations.

Griswold Muffin Pans is 148 pages of clear, sharp photos and line drawings. I have always admired Jon's line drawings for illustrating detail which would be nearly impossible to do photographically.

Due to the increased interest in collecting muffin pans and their variations, some prices have significantly increased in recent years. Because of huge prices being paid by the affluent collectors, collecting muffin pans has become more difficult for the average collector. Has collecting muffin pans become only for the elite? The author reinforces the elitist attitude by his statement, "The






rarest pans are beyond the reach of the average collector." Then he is condescending as he continues, "Collecting the 15 variations of the No. 10 Popover Pan or the 15 variations of the No. 22 Bread Stick Pan is affordable, enjoyable, and extremely challenging." Obviously, the author classifies himself with the elite. As a collector I disagree with the elitist perspective. However, if one's ego demands an instant collection, inflated prices will be paid. If you are content to pursue the hunt, looking for those elusive pieces at an affordable price (for the "average collector"), the rarest pans are obtainable. However, if the better pieces are not beyond the reach of the average collector today, they certainly will be if this book is taken seriously. The author states that the values in the book were obtained by considering, among other things, "recent transactions." The hazard of using this is obvious. All you need is one eager buyer dealing with an opportunist to reach an outrageous sale price. That sale should not set value on the general market. While preparing this report, I interviewed a collector who has a No. 947 10-cup golfball pan, which the author has dubbed a No. 9, and which has the pattern number on the bottom left cup. Because of the location of the pattern number, the author has increased the value of this pan from \$250-\$300 of the other variations to \$1,400-\$1,600 for this one. The author also states there is only one such pan known in the collecting community. The collector I interviewed stated he did not pay that much for this piece. Either there is more than one pan of this variation in the collecting community, or the value quoted is inflated.

The author values one variation of a No. 10 Popover Pan (other than the one marked USN) at \$125-\$150. If the average dealer puts this piece on his table for this price, he will probably keep it forever.

This book lists rarity for all pans on a scale of 1 to 10, 10 being the most rare. Thirteen pans are listed with a rarity of 10. How can you rate a No. 28 Bread Pan or a No. 19 loop handle golfball pan of which no examples are known in the collecting community with a #13, 2800, or 50 of which several are known? This comparison makes the rating system rather dubious.

I also take issue with the statement, "Reproductions are not the detriment to cast iron cookware collectors that they are to many areas of antique collecting... Even a novice collector should be able to distinguish between the originals and the reproductions." Tell this to the collector who bought a No. 280 Wheat stick pan at an auction - the pan was covered with burned-on grease. When the pan was cleaned it was found to be a repro. How many 262 Tea Size pans have been passed off on dealers and collectors? This field is plagued by reproductions - and the values in this book will increase that potential!

This book, Griswold Muffin Pans, minus the values, is an excellent reference. This book, with values, puts it in the same category as The Collectors Encyclopedia of Granite Ware by Greguire which with its inflated prices has been severely criticized and has been accused of substantially contributing to the ruination of the Granite Ware – D.G. Smith market.

Repro Alert! Seen at Burton, Ohio:

- Griswold Alarm Clock priced at \$1,800.
- 2) Dolly's Favorite Stove, blue porcelain, not marked.

Seen at Brimfield were repros of two toy pieces:

- 1) Griswold '0' Handle Griddle. A very fine, light casting – actually scary! Marking on the bottom appeared to have been manually done and was uneven.
- 2) Toy Simmons Waffle Iron with correct handles. This piece was heavily chromed, similar to the bright chrome repro '0' Griswold Skillet that is occasionally


