



Dave: I need a few answers on some questions. 1) I have a complete set of ERIE skillets, 3 with p/n and 5 without. I decided to try to put a set together, all with pattern numbers. I was at Springfield, Ohio and picked up 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10. While doing my paperwork, I discovered that 9 & 10 had different pattern numbers from the other 9 & 10 Erie skillets. I had my 11 Erie with p/n 718 and it is different from other 11 skillets. Your index on pattern numbers in The Book does not show pattern numbers 711, 715, and 718 assigned to Erie skillets. 2) Why does the 'B' on the #8 Erie skillet on page 16 (of The Book) make it special? 3) My 3 Tier D.O. rack has a p/n of 1071 - The Book has 1065. The feet on mine are stamped 239. 4) Can you explain all the duplication of p/n for the same pieces? -GP

GP: It is difficult to give a very definitive answer to your questions but I will give it a shot. 1.) From my findings it appears the earlier Erie skillets were numbered differently from the later Erie skillets which graduated to the Griswold marked skillets. Why the change in numbers, during the Erie marking period, I don't know. I have had a promise from a collector for an article about the logic of the Griswold numbering system. Perhaps this will shed some light on this subject, 2.) The position of the 'B' on the skillet (upper left) on page 16 of The Book makes it the most interesting. Usually the 'B' is found to the right of the pattern number. There has also been considerable discussion whether the 'B' is possibly a pattern maker mark. I don't know. There could be the possibly of it being an early quality control mark as was explained by past Griswold employees at a G&CICA convention. 3.) The top plates of the 3 Tier Dutch Oven Stand I had were numbered 1065 (see photo). I guess I never did check the feet, but that was years ago. I wonder if yours is of a slightly different design? 4.) I can't explain the duplication of pattern numbers. It doesn't make sense to me. Hopefully the upcoming article will help. Also, the pattern number chart in The Book is a compilation of information from many collectors like yourself. Your bringing to light the duplication of pattern numbers of the Erie skillets, and the new numbers of the Display Stand will be added to the pattern number list which will be published soon in The Book 2. ...and I thank you! I have said it before and will say it again, the only thing consistent with Griswold, was their inconsistency, -ed.



Dave: Ref. KnC, Vol. 7, No. 6, pg. 62; Did you and Arlo ever get your question answered (about the D.O. cover with the pinwheel design)? My Dutch Oven lid with this design came on a D.O. as shown below. I have seen a number of these D.O.s around the St. Louis area. -GP



GP: Many thanks for the information!!! It is collectors like you, willing to make the effort to share information, that makes KnC work! -ed.

Dear Dave: I have enclosed a few photos for you to look at as time permits. 1) The ones numbered 1 & 2 are of what appears to be a small (number 2) cast iron sauce pan(?) that belongs to my neighbor. It is about 2 3/4 inches deep and only 5 inches across. It is a tolerably smooth cast with a raised 2 on top of the handle, and no other marking. He remembers it being in his mom's home in the 40s. One local sage says that it is too small to be a deep chicken pan, but it might do for sparrow. What is your opinion as to manufacturer, use, and value of this little pan? - RW (Continued on Page 56)



RW: The raised number on the handle triggers Lodge. So does the quality of the casting. I checked an old Lodge catalog and they list a No. 2, (2 pint) sauce pan. This piece to me looks later than 1940s, however the raised number plays against that. I would value it at about \$25. There just isn't that much interest in Lodge. -ed.

2) I think I have another number for the book. Photo (right) shows a relatively common #8 hinged Dutch oven (smooth) p/n 2568 and lid #2598 on the left. I think this lid also fits the #8 hinged skillets per the 1940 catalog, pg. 20. The hinged Dutch oven (smooth) on the right carries p/n 2578 while the "Clean Easy" lid liner obscures the p/n on the under side. There are several differences in this piece from the presumably more common one on the left. Instead of the more Deco square handles, #2578 has handles that resemble bail lugs but flat on the bottom for better handling purchase when picked up without a bail. The hinge receptacle lugs are more squared than the rounded ones on #2568.

The big difference with the lids is that #2598 has pour covers to fit skillets, while the lid with #2578 is round to

handle the Dutch oven only. Interestingly enough, the 1940 catalogue shows the square handled #2568 and appropriate lid in both black and Silverlike, while an artistic rendering on a window sign board on page 4 of the same catalogue shows what appears to be the #2578 and lid. Perhaps p/n 2578 and its lid lasted only until Griswold wanted to market the Utility Set in which one lid fit three pieces? I would like your opinion on my theory, and as to the relative rarity and approximate date of this piece.



RW: I believe the catalog answers your questions as much as it raises them. It appears to me that both Dutch ovens are illustrated on the posters on page 4. Consequently, they must have been produced during the same period. Being this was a war time period, it created the situation where wire was not as available, consequently the bail handles were eliminated for the most part. That would explain the standard type ears on #2578 (right) without the wire bail handle. It would be interesting to see this bottom compared to the one in the 1942 supplement included in this issue of KnC, to compare the basic design of the ears, as it appears they are both of the rounded type. I would certainly encourage anyone else who would like to add their comments and/or opinions to please do so, -ed.

Mr. Smith: I enjoy the *Kettles 'n Cookware* publication and can't wait for the next copy. I would like to know if you have ever seen a pan #3 with KN stamped on the handle and Maid of Honor on the bottom of the pan? I would also like to know how much the new book in the spring will cost and when I can order? -MS


MS: The Maid of Honor skillets were made by Lodge Mfg. Co. for, I have been told, Sears Roebuck & Co. This skillet will be illustrated in Book 2. The publisher has told us the new book will be priced at \$29.95 and will be available in the spring. As it is coming together, it appears it will be nearly the size of The Book. -ed.





Wagner Foundry Gone

Wagner Ware Corporation management are remaining unavailable for comment about the status of the Wagner Foundry. However, the Sidney Daily News reports, "All signs indicate the financially troubled company has closed." A call from KnC resulted in the message that phones have been disconnected. Also, water and sewer services were shut off Sept. 27th, according to the Daily News. When the Daily News talked with a representative of the Ohio Bureau of Employment Services, they were told that the Bureau had not received any official notification that Wagner has closed. "We haven't heard from them either; we can't find anybody," the bureau representative said.

The Sidney Daily News also reported that two recent law suits have resulted in judgments against Wagner; one was a judgment for \$97,568 for shipments of aluminum to Wagner in 1998. Both judgments were uncontested by Wagner. Verification of a pending sale to General Housewares Corp. has proven fruitless. Several calls to GHC have not been returned, reports the Daily News.

According to a *KnC* source, the downfall of the company came when an unexpected audit was made. *KnC* has also learned that General Housewares Corp. only licensed the Wagner Trademark to the Wagner Ware Corp. - GHC still retains ownership. They did apparently sell the plant, however. Also, the Wagner Ware Corp. address has changed from 440 Fair Road, where it has been since 1891, to a Cincinnati, Ohio address. What a shame!










